#### NARRATIVE

Clearwater Lake (loop) Trail heads west from Forest Road #4370 and gradually descends to the Clearwater Lake shore. Canoes could be portaged this short 1/3 mile distance to the shoreline. A boat or raft would be handy for those planning to do some fishing, since the shoreline depth is relatively shallow. The lake supports average to large cutthroat trout.

There are several dispersed camping sites which provide an opportunity for overnight camping. Remember to pitch tents at least 200 feet from the lake shore to avoid any pollution problems.

Grand views of the Swan Mountain Range to the east are afforded the hiker, especially from the west side of the lake. Glimpses of the Mission Mountain Range to the west can be seen from the south shore of the lake too. Autumn hiking can be quite colorful as the western larch, alder, mountain maple and other shrubs change color.

## **ATTRACTIONS & CONSIDERATIONS**

Hikers seeking a short dayhike may want to take advantage of the length & relatively level terrain encountered on the Clearwater Lake Loop Trail. Hikers circling the lakes perimeter may get an opportunity to view diving ducks and possibly loons on the lake. This area also plays host to a variety of wildlife including: bobcat, bear, elk, deer, mountain lion and moose.
